

State of Iowa COVID-19 Response

Below is a summary of Governor Reynolds' Eleventh Emergency Disaster Proclamation compiled by attorneys Tim Coonan and Sydney Gangestad.

Her actions are authorized by Iowa Code Chapter 29C, Emergency Management and Security.

Section 20	All peace officers of the state are called upon to assist in the enforcement of the proclamation
Section 21	Nothing shall be construed as an exemption from any other provision of the lowa Code or Admin Code unless specifically identified
Section 22	Effective immediately and expires 5/27 at 11:59 p.m., unless sooner terminated or extended
